- 4. <u>Agitation</u>: the act or process of agitating; state of being agitated
- <u>Allusive</u>: having reference to something implied or inferred; containing, abounding in, or characterized by allusions.

- <u>Bantering</u>: to speak to in a playful or teasing way; good-humored, playful conversation

- 20. Belligerent: aggressively hostile; warlike

- 22. <u>Benevolent</u>: characterized by or expressing goodwill or kindly feelings

- <u>Bleak</u>: bare, desolate, and often windswept: a bleak plain; without hope or encouragement; depressing; dreary

- 26. **<u>Bombastic</u>**: pompous; haughty
- 27. <u>Callous</u>: unfeeling, insensitive to others
- 28. Candid: frank; outspoken; open and sincere
- 29. Cogent: convincing; reasonable
- 30. <u>Colloquial</u>: characteristic of or appropriate to ordinary or familiar conversation rather than formal speech or writing; informal
- <u>Conceited</u>: having an excessively favorable opinion of one's abilities, appearance, etc. vain, proud, egotistical, self-important, self-satisfied.
- 32. <u>Condescending</u>: showing or implying a usually patronizing descent from dignity or superiority
- <u>Contemptuous</u>: showing or expressing disdain; scornful, sneering, insolent, arrogant, supercilious, haughty; showing disrespect.
- 34. <u>Contentious</u>: tending to argument or strife; quarrelsome
- 35. <u>Conventional</u>: lacking spontaneity, originality, and individuality
- 36. <u>Convoluted</u>: complex or complicated
- <u>Credulous</u>: willing to believe or trust too readily, esp. without proper or adequate evidence; gullible; showing a lack of judgment or experience
- Crepuscular: having to do with shadowy areas (usually has to do with humanity)
- <u>Cultured</u>: enlightened; refined; the quality in a person or society that arises from a concern for what is regarded as excellent in arts, letters, manners, scholarly pursuits, etc.

- <u>Diffident</u>: lacking confidence in one's own ability, worth, or fitness; timid; shy; restrained or reserved in manner

- 50. <u>Disdainful</u>: contemptuous, haughty, scornful; expressing extreme contempt; having or showing superiority

- 52. Eccentric: departing from norms or conventions
- 53. Erudite: learned, polished, scholarly
- <u>Esoteric</u>: understood by or meant for only the select few who have special knowledge or interest; private; secret;
